## Friday 4th September



There comes a point when it is time to pause to reflect and take stock. It's a spiritual practice we probably don't do often enough, but it feels right at the moment. Perhaps that is because we believe where we are is temporary; we're not going to be doing church this way for ever, so it is okay to stop and look at where we are, and how we got there.

Sometimes we don't take stock because we get very used to a pattern and imagine it will see us out. Why do we have to 'change' things if we are doing just fine as it is? The reason is always because, when we settle down into a pattern, we tend not to move beyond, explore, or renew what we do, or allow fertile ground for new life to be injected back into what we are and believe.

Hopefully, the last six months have found us rethinking and reimagining things a little more, and new life has been found in some way. Church services are taking place in the sanctuary from this weekend, and perhaps we feel a small milestone has been reached, or something is happening that feels familiar again and we can relax a little: we haven't lost everything.

But we've never used the word 'return', or the phrase 'going back', because we have to realise neither of these is true. It's what the Israelites realised when they were at the Red Sea and countless times in the wilderness: can we not go back to Egypt? Where would we have been, and what would we have become, if they had?

This is an invitation for us all to take stock, reflect back on the last six months, and see where we once were and where we are now. I'd be really interested in hearing what we have learned about ourselves, what has worked and what hasn't, what is continuing to work, and what we can now let go.

It is a serious question, and it will take some serious and honest time for reflection. I'd like to offer some areas for us all to wonder about; but these aren't exclusive.

- What words would you use to describe 'church' now?
- In what way have you changed towards faith and spirituality?
- What has the congregation produced that has helped journey through lockdown and what has hindered?
- Have you heard faith stories differently since we moved worship onto podcasts and YouTube and phone lines? What have you learned?
- What do we do that engages a different generation if anything?
   Be honest.
- We've focussed a lot on worship and done a number of small community projects. The balance always seems to be towards worship when perhaps it ought to be the other way. In what way is this true or false?
- · What one thing has renewed you?
- Have we moved on, or are we going to 'go back' to what we have always done?

Please don't feel you need to answer all, or any, of these questions. This exercise is for reflection, but it would be good to hear what we can learn and how we might evolve. Some of these questions will be explored in <u>Babylon Files</u>, which will be returning soon. Thank you for your perseverance and loyalty, and your faith and generosity that have made sure we have found ourselves on new ground, and found ways of living there in faith.
