Remembrance Sunday

t seems that thee will be no official service at the War Memorial this year due to restrictions. That, however, invites us to mark the day in a different way in our community.


While some might informally

The Sanctuary service will begin, as usual, at 10.30 with an 11 o'clock silence, and the online services will be timed so that, if you start them at 10.30, you should arrive at 11 o'clock at the silence.

But we can do more to mark the day and we have offered, at the back of the Bulletin, an outline of a poppy. In the same way everyone responded to the harvest apple, we

would like to invite you to print out the poppy and colour it in, take a photo, and email it to us, or simply cut it out and pop it through the church hall letter box (or Manse). We will bring these together in a great montage on Friday 6th November into a large poppy in the upstairs windows of the New Halls, a symbol for our whole community.



Sunday 1st, 7.30, Zoom.

unday 1st of November is traditionally known as All Saints. It has not always been part of our tradition to recognise it, but what is very clearly part of our historic tradition is to recognise that everyone is a saint. That has been a deep rooted belief from the Reformation.

In the echo of that, perhaps, but also because we are human and need to recognise our pain and loss, we have a service to remember those we have lost over the last seven months. We have't been able to celebrate their lives in the way we would normally, and we haven't been able to support fully their families, so we offer a service at 7.30 on Sunday evening on Zoom, where we will take time to pause, reflect and in some way recognize the space these people have left, and to celebrate their stories.

We can't do that individually for each one on Sunday, but we will shape words, make space, give time, and recognise the place they have had, and still have, in all our memories. In that way, we can support their families and each other knowing, while we could not all be there in services of thanksgiving, we are here for their families and we will not forget or let their stories fade.

Whisper

It's the word 'Christmas'. Don't mention it too loudly but, frighteningly, it's creeping up on us and, while governments and authorities are stressing about how best to handle the festival, we have an opportunity to tell this story, that belongs to everyone, in a uniquely special way this year.

We will not be able to celebrate as we have in the past, and that is fine. It invites



us to rethink how we engage people with the promise and hope of the season. Christmas is about incarnation: God becoming one of us where we are, in this world, in all its realness. So, how might we speak of it this year? How might we unfold that promise more, such that it might help our communities and neighbourhoods find new meaning and possibility in this story, and help us through these times? How might we reenact nativity plays, carol services, light festivals, in a way that draws people into the story still, and offers Good News right in the heart of pandemics and winter solstice?

To that end, we are holding a short series of Wednesday evenings to think through what Christmas means and how we can offer moments and spaces beyond our sanctuary for folk in this season. It is an opportunity to completely think out the box, or out the church, drawing ideas, volunteering to help reshape, recreate and reimagine this festival beyond our walls.

You never know, we may invent a few new traditions as we go, finding life in this alternative approach to Christmas. Are you up for it?
