Dear Friends

I hope you have had a good new year and peace was found in Christmas and thank you for all your cards and good wishes.

It was quite busy this year as we returned to our 'normal' routine after three years of a pandemic and it was fabulous to see such a busy light festival. The church looked great on the evening, and we sang into Christmas Day at the watchnight with the great star hung there, leading us to the manger.

That has set us up for what this year might bring. The big discussion remains the Presbytery plan and to update you there: the plan was withdrawn from the last Presbytery meeting and, instead, we were invited to make comment which has been taken on board to reshape it, and an updated plan, apparently, is to be presented on March 11th at an all-day Presbytery meeting. I don't know what that will be as we have a consultation meeting with Presbytery next week but will keep you informed. There is still some work to do, but whatever the direction of travel will be, it will involve some change for everyone, and working closer together sharing resources, all of which we ought to be encouraging anyway as indeed we do through the sharing of worship over Christmas and New Year with the Cross church, and umpteen other things.

It is perhaps a time to think about how we have grown over the last year through our activities and outreach. We've connected with the broader community with our wellbeing group that meets in Massimo's every month - a huge thanks to Alex for organising and planning that. It has been a huge success.

We have had the return of Bearsden Festival, sharing the story of the Bearsden Shark, taking that into 9 different primary schools, along with a film festival of homemade films where families and individuals were taught how to make films and we had an Oscar night to view them all. We have a much deeper connection with St Gregory's Food Bank and thank you for the hugely generous support everyone gives that weekly and especially during focused collections at Christmas and Harvest.

Our new youth group, 'Something Different' is off the ground. Lots to do to help that find new life but we have taken the first steps in keeping our young teens with us.

The community outreach through gifts at all the festivals and the summer has been greatly appreciated. We've connected with those in our congregation as well as those further afield in our community, especially residential homes and sheltered housing. Thank you again for the teams that created, organised, and delivered.

Warm spaces continue to be available. They haven't been particularly busy, but we offer that space for all, and will continue to do so.

And coming up we are going to organise a series of community discussions around big themes that shape our society. We are going to organise these debates as a sign that the church is involved and engaged with the issues that affect us all, and has something to say, but not exclusively, and to offer a platform for all the voices of our community to engage with each other. Watch this space.

In these ways, as well as a hundred others, we are the church in this parish and continue to be so. Thank you.
