

Presbytery Mission Plan

As you know, we have been living with the development of the mission plan for some time now. It has gone through a great number of versions and the final draft, to be debated at Presbytery, has just been published.

For ourselves, let me simply offer you the rubric from the plan without any comment. The session will be discussing this in the next week or so before the presbytery meeting.

The original proposal for us to unite with Bearsden Cross has been augmented to include Cairns. There are historical links with Cairns given they left the congregation and became New Kilpatrick Relief Church setting up in Milngavie a long time ago.

The hope would be that two ministers would remain available to the three congregations by the end of the lifetime of the plan (five years) working as a team. New legislation of Team Ministry will hopefully be in place by then (there is no legislation for team ministry in the church at the moment!).

This will take some time to negotiate and put in place and we have the lifetime of the plan in which to do so. This process will require a spirit of openness, cooperation and collaboration for this to be missionally fruitful.

We have said that we wish to explore ways in which we could modernise our suite of buildings. Should we be allowed to do so, it is hoped that during such refurbishment work, ourselves and the Cross would worship together, allowing for opportunities for the three Ministers to preach in one another's churches, thus allowing for relationships to develop across the three congregations. As part of this process, the three churches, collectively, should assess all our buildings to determine how best to encourage and enable Mission in the first instance.

NOTE: In the event of a vacancy in either Bearsden Cross or New Kilpatrick, within the lifetime of the plan, then the relevant congregation will be allowed to call a Minister with representation from both congregations on the Nominating Committee.

My only comment for the moment is that there are a number of "hopefullys" and "should this be allowed" in all of that, which illustrates that the future shape of the church in our area is yet unknown, and we have been given the five years of the plan to develop that. During that time, there will be other changes in the church locally and

nationally which will have some impact on things, but perhaps we can see this as a very real opportunity to grow a creative group of congregations, working together to make a real difference again in our community.

Other parts of the plan, locally:

Killermont and Westerton should unite with a building at Killermont and a presence in Westerton which is being negotiated at the moment.

Baljaffray and St Luke go into a deferred union based in Baljaffray, with St Luke's land being developed.

St Paul's and Baldernock continue as a link but perhaps a union in due course.

The Presbytery debate is on Saturday 18th March and, if it is agreed then, it will be taken to Faith Nurture team at 121 and the General Trustees to be agreed. If that happens, then the plan comes back to Presbytery to be noted and becomes the Presbytery Mission Plan from that moment.

There is also the chance for people to pick up a story and reimagine it through their own words, or the eyes of some lesser character in the story. The idea is to gently stretch our worship and move it a little. Indeed 'liturgy' is a Greek work which describes 'the work of the people' through worship and prayer.

There is no pressure to do any of that, just come along to think ahead and be part of developing our worship in a variety of ways. It is also an opportunity to engage folk more deeply through the diversity of life .../

experiences, questions, and voices we now bring to worship. It will also be fun.

It is not something anyone needs to come along to every time, but when you feel able, creative, tired of the same pattern, or feel you have a place in leading worship with your voice and experience.
